Introduction

This gives Pekoe teas their distinctive appearance and taste because it allows more delicate flavors like bergamot oil to fully develop before drying them out too much with heat treatment processes such as firing or roasting

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Eventually, England colonized areas such as India. They brought their production methods with them and began producing black tea there instead of importing it from China. This had the effect of increasing supply and lowering prices for black tea in Britain, which led to its popularity in other parts of Europe as well. India was a major producer of black tea during this time period, but China was still king until 1839 when the British East India Company was the first company to introduce tea to the West.

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While black tea was being produced in China, the British East India Company (EIC) began importing it to England. The EIC was a major player in the history of tea and they were able to produce black tea more cheaply than importing it from China. They brought their production methods with them and began producing black tea there instead of importing it from China.
